State Plan Amendments

Copay Update

- American Indians are NOT subject to copays.
- AHCCCS is in the process of reviewing and updating its copayment schedule. The time line, amounts and services subject to copays will be updated since last presented to tribes on 9/19/13.
- AHCCCS is planning to implement copays for the new adult group (100-133% FPL) beginning 10/1/14 as follows:

Service	Copay Amount
Pharmacy	\$4.00
Office Visits	10% of cost paid by Agency (set by an average of included service codes)
Outpatient professional therapies	10% of cost paid by Agency (set by an average of included service codes)
Non-emergency use of the ER	\$8.00
Non-emergency surgery	10% of cost paid by Agency (set by an average of included service codes)
Taxis for non-emergency medical transportation	Up to 10% of cost paid by Agency (set by an average of included service codes for urban areas only)
Inpatient Stay	\$75.00

Tuba City Regional health Care Corporation

- One of the largest 638 facilities, Tuba City Regional Health Care Corporation located on Navajo Nation, has recently had to absorb the cost of care for the population incarcerated within the Navajo Detention Facility at Tuba City, even though these patients are federal trustees for whom the facility would otherwise be receiving reimbursement from Medicaid.
- Lack of availability of Medicaid funding for the care provided to these inmates is proving unsustainable for the Tuba City Regional Health Care Corporation, one of the most critical providers of care to the American Indian Medicaid enrolled population in Arizona.
- AHCCCS is proposing to preserve access to care for a critical Medicaid population that is largely American Indian living in rural and frontier areas; and collect data to establish a line item within the Indian Health Services budget as more of these facilities are built on reservation.
