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State Opioid Response (SOR):
The overarching goal of the project is to increase access to OUD treatment, coordinated and integrated care, recovery support services and prevention activities to reduce the prevalence of OUDs, stimulant use disorders, and opioid-related overdose deaths

- Increase trauma-informed prevention activities designed to reduce OUDs, stimulant use disorder, and opioid-related deaths.
- Improve access and retention in Arizona’s comprehensive MOUD system.
- Increase distribution and public awareness of the overdose reversal medication Naloxone
- Improve access to short-term and long-term recovery support services.
- Increase street-based outreach in an attempt to identify high-risk individuals, get them into treatment, and provide them with resource options in a more timely manner.
- Expand access to recovery support services including housing, peer support, and job search assistance.
