



2018 Integration: AHCCCS Complete Care

- Largest transition to integration in AHCCCS history.
- A HUGE step to integrate healthcare in a single ACC Health Plan that:
 - Includes physical and behavioral healthcare service providers (including CRS – 18k)
 - Manages the provider network for all healthcare services
 - Provides comprehensive managed care for the whole person







AHCCCS Care Delivery System

ADES/DDD to provide all other LTSS as well as a fee-for-service AIHP program for American Indian members.

Regional Behavioral Health Authorities (RBHAs) currently continue to provide and serve:


- Foster children enrolled in CMDP

- Crisis services, grant funded, and state-only funded services






Geographic Service Areas

Note: Zip codes 85542, 85192, 85550 representing San Carlos Tribal area are included in the South GSA.











Major Decisions

- 1. Mercy Care extended so all RBHA services will be transitioned at same time Oct 2022
- 2. We will be limiting our RFP (or transfer of services) to the current ACC plans in each area known contractors already with providers and members.



Major Decisions

- Allow for one ACC plan to provide expanded
 RBHA services in each Geographic Service Area.
- ACC Plan with expanded services will be called an ACC-RBHA. An ACC Plan with a Regional Behavioral Health "Agreement".



Members with SMI determination starting October 1, 2022







Major Decisions

- Through Competitive Contract Expansion (CCE) one ACC Plan in each GSA to provide:
 - Integrated service to individuals with SMI,
 - Non-TXIX/XXI State and grant funded services
 - Crisis services
- AHCCCS will retain and administer portion of grant funds that currently goes to RBHAs for prevention services



Administration of Primary Prevention Services

- AHCCCS conducted focus groups to gather information that will inform AHCCCS' administration of these dollars
- Preliminary Feedback
 - Approximately 130 attendees total
 - Targeted training needs identified
 - Recent events regarding racial and social justice has had an impact on the field and within the communities being served
 - Would like more regular communication with AHCCCS/DGA
 - Increase in funds available for training, credentialing, and community based prevention




Major Decisions - Opt Out

- Individuals with an SMI can continue to "opt out" of receiving physical health services from the ACC-RBHA.
- Member will be transferred to a different ACC Plan in the same GSA in order to provide physical health services;
- Members *must meet one or more of the conditions* outlined in the AHCCCS 1115 Waiver and our <u>policy</u>.




Major Decisions - Crisis Services

- ACC-RBHA in each GSA to be responsible for providing crisis services to all individuals within their awarded GSA.
 - mobile crisis teams
 - crisis stabilization services
- ACC-RBHAs will be required to collaborate to contract with a single,
 - statewide crisis phone vendor responsible for implementing an easy to use, 24/7 crisis phone number and crisis response system including mobile team dispatch.






Court Ordered Evaluations

Housing Administrator Timeline





Major Decisions - Housing Administrator

- Key responsibilities of the Housing Administrator will include, but not be limited to, acceptance of referrals from all AHCCCS programs, waitlist oversight, housing quality inspections, legal compliance, verification of eligibility documentation, member briefings, subsidy payments, renewals and required housing reporting.
- Review and award of SMI Housing Trust Fund monies for capital projects for members determined SMI will remain with AHCCCS as will oversight and distribution of housing funds to the TRBHAs.
- AHCCCS may employ a phased in approach for implementation of the Housing Administrator.



Major Decisions - Tribal Regional Behavioral Health Authority

As noted in a previous posting, a successful AHCCCS Complete Care Offeror that is awarded an expanded Contract under this Competitive Contract Expansion (CCE) will be referred to as an AHCCCS Complete Care Plan with a Regional Behavioral Health Agreement (ACC-RBHA).

Although the meaning of the acronym "RBHA" is changing, the acronym "TRBHA" will remain unchanged and continue to be the abbreviation for Tribal Regional Behavioral Health Authority.



AHCCCS Members who are American Indian/Alaska Native (AI/AN)


- Received feedback and input from tribal stakeholders at Tribal Forums and Tribal Consultation meetings on the following:

 - Should choices and service delivery be consistent with ACC choice for members not determined to be SMI, allowing integrated options?







Major Decision - Consistent Options for AI/AN AHCCCS members with SMI

- Integrated choices:
 - AIHP OR AIHP and TRBHA
 - An ACC-RBHA Plan for all services
- Members enrolled in AIHP for physical health services and a RBHA for behavioral health services will transfer to AIHP on October 1, 2022.
- AIAN members can still access services from an IHS or 638 facility at anytime regardless of enrollment and can change between AIHP and managed care as they do today.





Making Health Care Change





1115 Waiver & State Plan Overview

- States have flexibility in designing the their Medicaid program,
 and they can change aspects of their program at any time
- However, states must apply for and receive approval from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) before making changes to the program
- Two ways a state can go about changing their program:
 - A State Plan Amendment (SPA)
 - A Waiver




State Plan vs. 1115 Waiver

	State Plan Amendment	1115 Waiver
Submission to CMS	Proposed changes to Medicaid State Plan. Changes must comply with federal Medicaid requirements.	Formal request to have certain federal Medicaid requirements waived
What States Can Request	Can address any aspect of Medicaid program administratione.g. eligibility, benefits, services, provider payments, etc.	Seek changes that cannot be implemented through state plan amendments.
Budget Requirements	No cost or budget requirements	Budget neutral for the federal government
Approval Process	90 day clock that can be suspended if CMS request information from state.	Approval process includes robust public notice process and extensive negotiations with CMS.
Duration of Approval	Permanent	Time limited. Must be renewed every 5-years.



 - Exceeding the \$1,000 emergency dental limit for adult members and the \$1,000 dental limit for individuals age 21 or older enrolled in the ALTCS program





AHCCCS Whole Person Care Initiative (WPCI)

- Launched in November 2019
- Next step after integrated care
- Building off of existing programming and services to further address social risk factors of health including:
 - housing, employment, criminal justice, transportation, and social isolation
- Includes a collaborative partnership with Arizona's Health Information Exchange (HIE), Health Current, for technology that will facilitate screening for social risk factors and referral to community resources

There is growing national attention on the impact social factors can have on a person's health and well-being. It is believed that a person's socio-economic status, behaviors, and physical environment contribute more to health outcomes than access to health care. AHCCCS understands these complex issues and has historically worked to provide housing, employment, criminal justice, non-emergency transportation as well as home and community-based services interventions to our members, which facilitates the appropriate utilization of Medicaid services, while also utilizing a broad range of funding sources for services that are not available under the Arizona Medicaid program.



COVID-19 Information

AHCCCS is responding to an outbreak of respiratory illness, called COVID-19, caused by a novel (new) coronavirus. Health officials urge good hand washing hygiene, covering coughs, and staying home if you are sick.

On March 11, Governor Doug Ducey issued a Declaration of Emergency 🗗 📆 and an Executive Order 🗗 regarding the COVID-19 outbreak in Arizona, and subsequent Executive Orders 🗗 with further administrative actions.

On March 17, 2020, AHCCCS submitted a request to the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) to waive certain Medicaid and KidsCare requirements in order to ensure ongoing access to care over the course of the COVID-19 outbreak. As of March 23, AHCCCS has received federal approval to implement programmatic changes to help ensure access to health care for vulnerable Arizonans.

To address Medicaid-related questions from providers and contractors about COVID-19, AHCCCS has developed a list of Frequently Asked Questions Regarding Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19), updated regularly s more information becomes available.






COVID-19 Timeline - Obtaining Flexibilities

COVID-19 Federal Emergency Authorities Request

On March 17 and March 24, 2020, the Arizona Health Care Cost Containment System (AHCCCS) submitted requests to the Administrator for the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) to waive certain Medicaid and KidsCare requirements to enable the State to combat the continued spread of 2019 novel coronavirus (COVID-19). AHCCCS is seeking a broad range of emergency authorities to:

- . Strengthen the provider workforce and remove barriers to care for AHCCCS members
- . Enhance Medicaid services and supports for vulnerable members for the duration of the emergency period
- · Remove cost sharing and other administrative requirements to support continued access to services

The allowances from CMS grant broad authority to Arizona to tailor changes to best serve its citizens. AHCCCS will make decisions about how and when these changes will be implemented.

AHCCCS will pursue the extension of some of the flexibilities granted 🌱 (updated 7/21/2020) during the public health emergency.



Key Flexibilities Offered During the Public Health Emergency

- Streamline provider enrollment
- Amend prior and continued authorization processes
- Provide continuous eligibility
- Waive premiums and copays
- Coverage for COVID testing
- Electronic method for services (telehealth and telephonic)

2020 Year In Review - COVID-19 PHE Response

- Obtained permission to pursue more than 46 programmatic flexibilities from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services. Key flexibilities implemented include:
 - Expanding the program's telehealth benefit to allow for a broader range of services to be provided electronically.
 - Expediting the provider enrollment process.
 - Reimbursing parents for care offered to their minor children and allowing spouses offering paid care to be paid beyond the standard 40 hours per week limit.
 - Reimbursing for services offered by hospitals and clinics owned or operated by the Indian Health Service, tribes or tribal organizations with a 638 agreement in Alternate Care Sites (ACS) during the public health emergency.



2020 Year In Review - COVID-19 PHE Response

- Offered provider financial relief:
 - Made over \$59 million in additional payments to nursing facilities, assisted living facilities, home and community based service providers and critical access hospitals.
 - Advanced or accelerated more than \$90 million in funding to hospitals, primary care providers, behavioral health outpatient providers, and justice clinic providers who participate in the agency's Targeted Investments Program and hospitals participating in the graduate medical education program.



Grants Update



Emergency Grant to Address Mental and Substance Abuse Disorders During COVID-19



- Awarded \$2 million to support efforts throughout Arizona
- Working with RBHAs and TRBHAs to implement specific grant requirements in their network and/or service areas
- Areas of focus:
 - Recovery housing for those who cannot return home or to alternative care levels due to COVID-19 symptoms
 - Counseling and support groups for healthcare workers
 - Increased engagement for Substance Use needs
 - PPE for service providers within the grant scope



COVID-19 Emergency Response for Suicide Prevention Grant

- AHCCCS awarded \$800,000
- Funding period: 7/31/2020-11/30/2021
- To be implemented in Pima County
- Project pairs suicide prevention services with domestic violence services, including emergency housing. AHCCCS is working with Arizona Complete Health, Community Bridges, CODAC, and EMERGE Domestic Violence Center on this grant.
- AHCCCS added a full time project director, Albert Swanson, for this work who joined suicide prevention team in the Office of the Director.
- Other recipients in Arizona include: EMPACT and the Pasqua Yaqui Tribe.



Crisis Counseling Program (CCP) & Immediate Services Program (ISP)

- The mission of the FEMA-SAMHSA CCP/ISP Grant is to assist individuals and communities in recovering from the challenging effects of natural and human-caused disasters through the provision of community-based outreach and psychoeducational service
- Short term disaster relief services offered both (telephonic and virtual services)
 - Individual Counseling
 - Group Counseling
 - Brief Educational Supportive Contacts
 - Public Education Meetings and Public Service Announcements
 - Assessment, Referral and Resource Linkage
 - Community Networking and Support
- AHCCCS Partnered with the Crisis Response Network to serve as the Contractor to implement/oversee the program. CRN
 partnered with multiple agencies to provide services: Crisis Preparation and Recovery, EMPACT, Family Involvement Center, The
 Guidance Center, La Frontera and RI International
- AHCCCS was awarded the Grant on 6.3.2020; CRN created Resilient Arizona Crisis Counseling Program and the program was launched on 6.22.2020
 - Resilientarizona.org and call 2-1-1 to talk to a crisis counselor



CCP & RSP (Regular Services Program)

- The mission of the FEMA-SAMHSA CCP RSP is to continue the implementation and services launched in the ISP CCP Grant
- The RSP Application was submitted on June 29, 2020
- The funding will provide for 9 more months of funding from the Award date-ISP funding is through July 29th, 2020
- Receiving the RSP Grant award will allow the continuation of crisis counseling services, the continuation of the 2-1-1 line and public services announcements and education





- Awards have been made and are broken out by county coverage

Abuse and Neglect Task Force Updates



Abuse and Neglect Task Force Update

- Convened by the Governor's Executive Order to ensure the health and safety of Arizona's most vulnerable citizens.
- Met monthly from March- September 2019.
- Abuse and Neglect Prevention Task Force Report approximately 30 recommendations
- Posted **Minimum Subcontract Provisions** in August, effective 10/1/20 for AHCCCS Providers:
 - o ADULT PROTECTIVE SERVICES (APS) REGISTRY CHECK
 - o ABUSE, NEGLECT, AND EXPLOITATION PREVENTION
 - CORPORATE GOVERNANCE FOR PROVIDERS
- AHCCCS and our contractors will continue to develop and enforce policies and processes to implement, oversee and monitor the operation of these provisions.



Looking back at 2020



2020 - Year in Review

- Successfully transitioned more than 60 percent of AHCCCS employees to a virtual work environment, allowing the agency to consolidate two main campus buildings into one.
- Supported the work of the Governor's Abuse and Neglect Prevention Task Force through the Oct.
 1, 2020 implementation of minimum subcontract provisions aimed at preventing abuse, neglect, and exploitation.
- Launched the AHCCCS Provider Enrollment Portal (APEP), allowing providers to enroll with AHCCCS electronically any time of day.
- Implemented an **Electronic Visit Verification system** to verify member receipt of critical in-home services.
- Improved the timely processing of Medicaid applications to 94 percent for non-ALTCS applications and to 91 percent for ALTCS applications.



2020 - Year in Review

- Increased influenza vaccine rates by 10 percent to incentivize provider administration of the vaccine and partnered with health plans to offer managed care members a \$10 gift card for receiving a flu shot.
- Added more than 3,000 members to American Indian Medical Homes, improving care coordination for members served in IHS and 638 facilities.
- Created a **Health Equity Committee** to examine and understand health disparities that exist within the program and to develop strategies to ensure health equity for all AHCCCS members.
- Partnered with policy makers and hospitals to develop a new assessment, increasing payments to eligible hospitals by \$800 million annually.
- Increased rates by an estimated \$380 million for dental providers and practitioners.
- Secured more than \$37 million in grant funding to address the opioid epidemic, expand the state's suicide prevention work, and meet emergent needs related to the COVID-19 pandemic.



On the Horizon

- Roll out of Electronic Visit Verification
- Implementation of closed-loop referral system
- Release of RFP and award of competitive contract expansion contracts
- Implementation of integrated care product for children in the foster care system on 4/1/21
- Renewal of 1115 waiver on or before 10/1/21



AHCCCS Complete Care 2020-2022 Delivery System Integration






