The integration mandate of the ADA requires public agencies to provide services in the "most integrated setting appropriate to the needs of qualified persons with disabilities".....

What Do People with Disabilities Want?

SIMPLE: What Everybody Wants.....to live, work and participate in their community life.

What Are Key Components of Community Life?

- HOUSING: affordable, adequate, accessible and integrated
- EDUCATION: affordable, adequate, accessible and integrated
- EMPLOYMENT: competitive, adequate, accessible and integrated

What Role Does Case Management Play in This?

- These three components should provide a foundation for assisting your members.
- As a key point person in the life of a person with a disability, you are uniquely positioned as a resource/support for attaining a better community life.
- Changing paradigms always requires everybody's cooperation and effort.

Why is This Important?

- Understanding these components and working on them will have a positive impact on people's lives.
- All federal and state policy is moving in this direction and focusing on integration and independence.
- The law requires it.
