Regional Behavioral Health Authorities (RBHAs) will continue to collaborate and meet regularly with children/adolescent providers to share information on substance abuse screening, trends and best practices.

ADHS/DBHS and RBHAs will provide and promote access to substance abuse training initiative available to children/adolescent providers- including those employed through other agencies, such as Child Protective Services and Juvenile Justice as well as education for medical providers and teachers.

ADHS/DBHS and RBHAs will educate treatment providers, prevention providers, and coalitions on how to engage community stakeholders in identifying and referring youth to early intervention and substance abuse treatment services.

ADHS/DBHS will ensure the availability of a standardized, parent-friendly, screening tool to identify substance use/abuse in children and adolescents.

Reason why target was not achieved, and changes proposed to meet target:

The percent of youth in the behavioral health system receiving substance abuse services decreased slightly from FY2012 (6.9%) to FY2013 (6.8%).

RBHAs have been working to promote access to substance abuse treatment services for adolescents during meetings with providers and collaborators, and through school and community-based trainings. Trainings provided by RBHAs, have included components on how to screen for substance abuse in the adolescent population, and effective substance abuse treatment of such as ACRA and other evidence based practices targeting the adolescent population. Additionally, providers continue to utilize SA screening tools, including ASAM and CRAFFT.

Reason why target was not achieved, and changes proposed to meet target:

In order to capture the number of those served in the behavioral health system more accurately, there was a change in methodology in reporting. Historically, the counts were based on enrolled; this year and moving forward the reporting will be based on the number of those enrolled and served. This change has caused reporting to have the appearance of decreasing. The percent of youth in the behavioral health system receiving substance abuse services decreased slightly from FY2014 (3.6%) to FY2015 (2.4%). Arizona has continued to focus on this population through the use of trainings and the expanding the use of the American Society of Addiction Medicine (ASAM) to adolescents. RBHAs monitor for utilization of services and funds, as well as utilization of evidence-based SUD treatment. RBHAs have been working to promote access to substance abuse treatment services for adolescents during meetings with providers and collaborators, and through school and community-based trainings. Trainings provided by RBHAs, have included components on how to screen for substance abuse in the adolescent population, and effective substance abuse treatment of such as ACRA and other evidence based practices targeting the adolescent population. Additionally, providers continue to expand the utilization of SUD screening tools, including ASAM and CRAFFT.

Reduce the rates of older adult (55+) deaths from 15.9 to 15.5 and hospitalizations from 110.6 to 110.0 due to poisonings.

Strategies to attain the goal:

Expand the Prescription Drug Initiative statewide incorporating a variety of prevention and early intervention strategies. Strategies include ongoing engagement with the medical community to increase participation with the Prescription Drug Monitoring Database, use of the Screening, Brief Intervention, and Referral to Treatment, and community education on safe storage practices.

Description of Data:

Mortality data were compiled from the death certificates registered with the Arizona Department of Health Services Office of Vital Registration. Any death record for an Arizona resident assigned an International Classification of Diseases, 10th Revision (ICD-10) code for poisoning as the underlying cause of death was included in the count. Poisonings due to envenomation by animals, plants, or insects (X20 – X29) were excluded from this report. Inpatient hospitalization discharge data and emergency department discharge data from 2007 through 2011 were compiled from the Arizona Hospital Discharge Database at the Arizona Department of Health Services. The discharge database contains information from private, acute-care facilities in the state of Arizona, and do not include visits to federal facilities, such as Veterans' Affairs Hospitals or Indian Health Services facilities.

ADHS/DBHS CIS records all encounters for behavioral health services.

Data issues/caveats that affect outcome measures:

The discharge databases do not contain data from urgent care facilities, private physician practices, or medical clinics. Hospital discharge data include hospital transfers and readmissions. Therefore, a single injured individual may be counted more than once. These data should be interpreted as episodes of medical treatment, not individual injuries.

Encounters may be submitted up to 210 days after the service is rendered causing a data lag.

Reason why target was not achieved, and changes proposed to meet target:

In FY14, rates for hospitalizations due to poisoning as defined by emergency room visits rates and inpatient discharge rates for Arizona residents ages 65 and older, both had rates of 15.0 per 100,000.

The Arizona Office of Population Health and Vital Statistics data on death and hospitalizations are reported by age groups. The rates reported here represent the elderly-aged group ages 65 and older. Additionally, hospitalizations due to poisonings are broken out by rates for emergency room visits and inpatient discharge.

RBHAs continue to work with councils, providers, and community agencies to make appropriate referrals and monitor substance use diagnoses among the older adult population, as well as attend educational events, such as the Area Agency on Aging conference. Arizona is continuing to expand the use of SBIRT in order to reach older adults with substance use disorders who are receiving medical care.

Reason why target was not achieved, and changes proposed to meet target:

Due to the consolidation of ADHS/DBHS with the State Medicaid Authority, changes to the data collected and reported are required. ADHS/DBHS previously reported on the number of hospitalizations, moving forward, the number of individuals 55 and older receiving behavioral health services will be reported. In FY14, 14.2% of the enrolled population 55 years old and older had an SUD compared to 29.5% in FY13. Arizona is working to ensure that individuals 55 and older are being screened and referred to substance abuse treatment services when needed.

RBHAs continue to work with councils, providers, and community agencies to make appropriate referrals and monitor substance use diagnoses among the older adult population, as well as attend educational events, such as the Area Agency on Aging conference. Providers have implemented programs tailored to the older adult population, such as a "Senior Peer" program that provides preventative services, resource connections and limited counseling and peer/family support services, and an "Older Adult Behavioral Health" program that focuses on providing an array services in clinic. Arizona is continuing to expand the use of SBIRT in order to reach older adults with substance use disorders who are receiving medical care.

Reason why target was not achieved, and changes proposed to meet target:

Enrollment of service members and veterans for substance abuse services out the total number enrolled in the behavioral health system increased from 0.6% in FY2012 to 1.1% in FY2013. Please note, the percent of service members and veterans out of the number of individuals enrolled in the Arizona behavioral health system for substance abuse services is 3.5%.

Our RBHAs have been collaborating in various capacities, including holding memberships in ACMF's Resource Network and ACMF Leadership Council, and collaborating on ACMF's Resource Navigator training and the VA's Veteran's Summit. Additionally, Rally Point Tucson, a program of CPSA, staffed by experienced veterans continues to help veterans and their families in Pima County navigate and access various resources. Providers throughout the state have been engaged in multiple trainings that are specific to the needs of service members, such as Mental Health First Aid for Military, Veteran and Their Families, Trauma Informed Care, PTSD, Traumatic Brain injury, and employment assistance.

Enrollment of service members and veterans for substance abuse services decreased from 2,560 individuals in FY2013 to 2,165 in FY2013. The decrease in numbers is due in part to a change in how data is reported. In order to capture the number of those served in the behavioral health system more accurately, there was a change in methodology in reporting. Historically, the counts were based on enrolled; this year and moving forward the reporting will be based on the number of those enrolled and served. Arizona Regional Behavioral Health Authorities (RBHAs) have been collaborating in various capacities, including holding memberships in Arizona Coalition for Military Families (ACMF's) Resource Network and ACMF Leadership Council, and collaborating on ACMF's Resource Navigator training and the VA's Veteran's Summit. Additionally, Rally Point Tucson, a program of CPSA, staffed by experienced veterans continues to help veterans and their families in Pima County navigate and access various resources. In addition, Rally Point Tucson is an active member of Tucson Veterans Serving Veterans, which facilitates the annual Tucson Homeless Veteran Stand Down event. Providers throughout the state have been engaged in multiple trainings that are specific to the needs of service members, such as Mental Health First Aid for Military, Veteran and Their Families, Trauma Informed Care, PTSD, Traumatic Brain injury, employment assistance, and resource navigation.

The outcomes of this pilot will be tracked to determine the impact on a client's overall health. Based on the outcomes of this pilot, healthcare integration for the SMI population will be rolled out statewide. ADHS/DBHS will work closely with the healthcare providers to ensure that clients are receiving both physical and behavioral health services and that there is continued collaboration between all professionals.

Reason why target was not achieved, and changes proposed to meet target:

The percent of COC occurring for SMI clients in Maricopa County decreased from 97.4% in FY2012 to 88.2% in FY2013.

As mentioned, ADHS will monitor and assist Maricopa County with the pilot healthcare integration program to provide behavioral and physical health care in one location for Seriously Mentally Ill (SMI) members in FY14. MMIC, the RBHA for Maricopa County has assigned Care Management staff at each Adult Provider Network Organization (APNO) direct clinic in order to provide a direct link to education and technical assistance; this has allowed an increase in awareness of the medical health related needs, service utilization monitoring, identify gaps, and provide educational resources related to coordination of care with medical providers. The Care Management staff also ensures the treatment goals in the members' Care Plans address both their physical and behavioral health needs. Efforts to increase Primary Care Providers (PCP) knowledge of behavioral health needs is also being addressed through the Integrated Care Training Academy which occurs quarterly, and includes topics such as the SBIRT process.

Arizona has set standards for coordination of care and monitors progress through regular deliverables. While Arizona has not achieved the goal of 100% compliance with coordination of care, there continues to be the expectation that PCP and behavioral health provide integrated services. Arizona will continue to monitor progress towards the goal. Arizona is working to establish a statewide electronic health record to facilitate the coordination of care.

Reason why target was not achieved, and changes proposed to meet target:

Strategies utilized by RBHAs and providers for collaborations include the following: creating a protocol for pregnant females using drugs intravenously in order to ensure MAT medications are appropriately prescribed for this population; collaboration with Arizona's Family First Program which provides substance use treatment services to parents who have involvement with DCS due to abuse of substances; and collaboration through the Women's Services Network who are currently developing tools for outreach to women in the community. In addition to statewide use of updated SABG posters, a Women's Services Directory was developed this last year that lists all treatment providers with treatment services and programs that are gender specific to women, and the Women's Treatment Group is developing a pamphlet and short video summarizing women's services that will be displayed for incarcerated women in jails, hospitals, and domestic violence shelters. Monitoring of the number of women in substance abuse treatment (particularly those on the waitlist), encounter values is being conducted statewide.

Each fall, the Arizona Department of Health Services, Division of Public Health and Statistics (ADHS/PHS) calculates the State's suicide rate by determining the number of death certificates of Arizona residents where "Suicide" was indicated by a medical examiner as the cause of death during the second most recent complete calendar year (i.e. CY 2010 data will be made available in fall 2011). This number is then aggregated across the general population to establish a suicide rate per 100,000 persons. This information is then published on the ADHS/PHS website for public dissemination (see <http://www.azdhs.gov/plan/report/ahs/index.htm>)

How first year target was achieved (optional):

The suicide rate in Arizona decreased from 17.2 suicides per 100,000 in calendar year 2011 to 16.2 per 100,000 in calendar year 2012.

Reason why target was not achieved, and changes proposed to meet target:

The suicide rate in Arizona increased from 16.2 suicides per 100,000 in calendar year 2012 to 17.0 per 100,000 in calendar year 2013. Arizona has participated in and/or sponsored various suicide prevention conferences and trainings, such as the Arizona Suicide Prevention Conference, ASIST (Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training), and Mental Health First Aid. Over one million individuals have completed ASIST. ASIST is a Maricopa-based two-day workshop, that helps providers, community members, and employees feel more comfortable, confident, and competent in helping to prevent the immediate risk of suicide. Arizona is working to develop the capacity of coalitions and committees that focus on bullying and suicide prevention, such as the Suicide Continuum of Care Committee in Southern Arizona and the Arizona Suicide Prevention Coalition. Additionally, one provider has funded 3 police drop off programs which assess for substance use disorders as well as DTS/DTOs. Arizona has worked to develop a statewide suicide prevention plan in collaboration with multiple stakeholders as well as input from SAMHSA.

Arizona has worked to improve MAT access and availability through provider network monitoring to assess needs, expanding lists of approved MAT medications, and increasing convenience of locations and hours. Providers and their prescribers receive training on the availability and use of MAT services, as well as education on MAT medications. Additionally, there is now Methadone and Suboxone Directories available for Maricopa County to assist in making appropriate referrals.

Reason why target was not achieved, and changes proposed to meet target:

While a lack of treatment capacity is often cited as the barrier to receiving MAT, areas such as lack of appropriate referral sources and a limited formulary all contribute to reduced access. Arizona has worked to improve MAT access and availability through provider network monitoring to assess needs, expanding lists of approved MAT medications, and increasing convenience of locations and hours. Providers and their prescribers receive training on the availability and use of MAT services, as well as education on MAT medications. Methadone and Suboxone Directories are available for Maricopa County to assist in making appropriate referrals. Additionally, collaborative meetings were held in Southern Arizona with medical assisted treatment site directors in southern Arizona to address issues identified in secret shopper calls, such as members waiting too long to receive services, high physician case loads and lack of space at provider sites. Based on the 2013 Independent Case Review (ICR), the percent of clients entering substance abuse treatment who are screened for tuberculosis increased to 14.6% compared to 14% during the 2011 ICR. However, we did not reach our goal of increasing by 5%. Strategies focused on developing mechanisms to document and verify TB screening of those entering substance abuse treatment were implemented this last year. Such strategies providers are implementing include: integrating education on TB (along with other communicable diseases) into client orientations, providing educational materials on TB to clients, providing clients with referral handouts for TB and HIV testing at specified locations, as well as including elements to capture TB screening documentation in contractors' audit tools.

Arizona Department of Health Services/Division of Behavioral Health Services (ADHS/DBHS) submitted a Corrective Action Plan (CAP) June 30, 2014 as required by Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) to meet the special terms of the award in the June 6, 2014 Notice of Grant Award, SABG Grant Number 2B08TIO10004-14. The CAP described steps which would be taken by ADHS/DBHS in order to comply with block grant reporting requirements.

ADHS/DBHS has since developed reporting spreadsheets for each for each of the prevention tables in order to capture for each contracted provider. The information conforms precisely to the reporting tables for the SABG. Each contractor will be required to submit the spreadsheets for each Federal Fiscal Year which will allow ADHS/DBHS to confirm that the amount reported conforms to the required set aside. All prevention activities are reported based on IOM category for each Federal Fiscal Year. As indicated in the CAP, ADHS/DBHS will come into compliance for FFY2016. For any entity without an I-BHS ID number, enter the provider's street address, city and zip code in the appropriate columns. If the state is funding more than one of the organization's locations in the SPA, enter the address and of its main administrative office.
If the entity has an I-BHS ID, enter that number here. I-BHS ID have the format of XX999999, where XX is the state abbreviation and 999999 is a unique number. For treatment providers that have more than one location, and therefore more than one I-BHS ID number, enter the number for the organization's main administrative office. For non-treatment providers, place an "X" in the box, indicating the entity has no I-BHS ID. All entities with expenditures in column 10 should have an I-BHS number.
A unique identifier for the state which defines the states Sub-state Planning Area. An entity may serve the whole State (Statewide) or an entity may serve several areas. For example, entity 1 is a program that serves the entire State. When completing column 8 for this entity, enter code "99." A code of "99" must be entered for any Statewide program.
This column reports the total FFY 2010 SABG funds awarded to each entity/provider. (This column did not exist in previous SABG reports.) For each row, the amount in column 9 should be the sum of the amounts in columns 10, 12 and 13.

If the state was not a designated state for FFY 2010, enter zero for each entity. If the state was a designated state for FFY 2010, enter the amount of funds for pre-test counseling, testing, post-test counseling, and the provision of therapeutic measures to diagnose the extent of deficiency in the immune system to prevent and treat the deterioration of immune system, and to prevent and treat conditions arising from HIV/AIDS. Include the cost of making referrals to other treatment providers in this item. (Do not include funds for state administration or resource development costs in this column.)

Narrative explaining the calculation methodology

The Arizona Department of Health Services (ADHS), Office of Infectious Disease Services provided the total number of TB Cases in SFY15, which are 157. The Division of Behavioral Health Services then compared identifying information provided by the Office of Infectious Disease Services to the Client Information System (CIS) in order to determine if any clients received substance use disorder treatment during SFY15. Of those 157 cases, 14 reported a substance use disorder. The result was 14 cases or 8.9% of the total TB cases in Arizona.

Therefore, the total of all State funds spent on TB services (\$553,000) multiplied by the percent of TB expenditures spent on TB clients with a substance use disorder (8.9%) equals the total State funds spent on clients who were in substance use disorder treatment (\$49,217).

**Revision Request:**

Per AZ's Corrective Action Plan submitted on June 30, 2014 to comply with the SABG FFY 2014 Special Terms and Conditions required by CSAP, the state detailed the measures that will be taking in their system in order to correctly report these prevention expenditures in future years effective FFY 2015. **Response:**

Arizona Department of Health Services/Division of Behavioral Health Services (ADHS/DBHS) submitted a Corrective Action Plan (CAP) June 30, 2014 as required by Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) to meet the special terms of the award in the June 6, 2014 Notice of Grant Award, SABG Grant Number 2B08TIO10004-14. The CAP described steps which would be taken by ADHS/DBHS in order to comply with block grant reporting requirements.

ADHS/DBHS has since developed reporting spreadsheets for each for each of the prevention tables in order to capture for each contracted provider. The information conforms precisely to the reporting tables for the SABG. Each contractor will be required to submit the spreadsheets for each Federal Fiscal Year which will allow ADHS/DBHS to confirm that the amount reported conforms to the required set aside. All prevention activities are reported based on IOM category for each Federal Fiscal Year. As indicated in the CAP, ADHS/DBHS will come into compliance for FFY2016. ADHS/DBHS has disseminated the newly developed spreadsheets and has provided training and technical assistance to all contractors. ADHS/DBHS has received the completed tables from all contractors for FFY2015 and is on track for reporting for FF2018.

The Arizona Department of Health Services', Division of Behavioral Health Services (ADHS/DBHS), serves as the single state authority, providing coordination, planning, administration, regulation and monitoring of all facets of the state public behavioral health system. ADHS/DBHS contracts with community based organizations, known as Regional Behavioral Health Authorities (RBHAs), to administer behavioral health services throughout the State. The RBHAs receive SAPT funds and are, therefore, held accountable to the compliance requirements of the grant – including the Charitable Choice provisions as outlined by 42 U.S.C. 300x-65 and 42 U.S.C. 290kk, et seq., and additionally defined in Arizona Revised Statute (A.R.S.) 41-3751 et seq. Accordingly, the Division's Provider Manual includes guidance to help ensure that persons receiving substance abuse treatment services under the SAPT Block Grant have the right to receive services from a provider to whose religious character they do not object. Behavioral health subcontractors providing substance abuse services under the Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment Block Grant must notify persons of this right using a standard document (attachment 3.19.1). Providers must document that the person has received notice in the person's comprehensive clinical record. If a person objects to the religious character of a behavioral health provider, the provider must refer the person to an alternative provider within 7 days, or earlier when clinically indicated, after the date of the objection. The alternative provider must be accessible to the client and have the capacity to provide substance abuse services. The services provided by the alternative provider must be of a value not less than the value of the services the client would have received from the original organization. Upon making such a referral, providers must notify the RBHA of the referral and ensure that the person makes contact with the alternative provider. As part of regular business practices, the Division provides on-going training and technical assistance to the RBHAs on all aspects of the Provider Manual, including charitable choice compliance.
